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UNDERSTANDING FMCSA PROGRAM

State Funding for Safety

MCSAP provides funding to states for programs that enhance commercial motor vehicle safety and compliance with regulations.

Crash and Injury Reduction

The program aims to reduce crashes, injuries, and fatalities involving large trucks and buses across the nation.

Consistent Regulation Enforcement

MCSAP promotes the uniform enforcement of safety rules and encourages data-driven strategies to improve roadway safety.

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ORIGINS OF MCSAP

Program Establishment

MCSAP was created in 1982 to promote commercial motor vehicle safety through federal and state partnership.

Safety Funding and Support

The program provides federal funds to states for vehicle inspections, enforcement, and safety education.

Focus on Technology and Data

MCSAP expanded to include data collection and technology-driven safety methods, reducing highway accidents and fatalities.

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MOTOR CARRIER SAFETY ASSISTANCE PROGRAM (MCSAP) GRANT

Only State MCSAP lead agencies, designated by the Governor of each of the 56 States and territories as responsible for administering the Commercial Vehicle Safety Plan (CVSP), are eligible to apply for MCSAP funding. State partners work with FMCSA throughout the application and grant management process to ensure that funded programs improve CMV safety and support an efficient transportation system.

The MCSAP formula grant provides financial assistance to State and local law enforcement agencies to increase CMV-related enforcement and safety activities nationwide. These MCSAP lead agencies work together with FMCSA to reduce the number and severity of crashes and hazardous materials incidents involving CMVs.

MCSAP is FMCSA's largest grant program, providing \$480 Million in funding to 56 State and local law enforcement agencies in FY 2024. Through this funding and programmatic support, the Agency partners with grantees to support consistent, uniform, and effective CMV safety programs.



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MCSAP INITIATIVES TODAY

Targeted Inspections and Enforcement

The program prioritizes targeted commercial vehicle inspections and enforcement to improve safety and reduce risks on the road.

Data-Driven Strategies

Initiatives use data analysis to identify high-risk carriers and enhance regulatory compliance in the commercial vehicle industry.

Collaboration and Training

The program promotes collaboration with state agencies and provides training to ensure uniform safety standards nationwide.



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ORIGINS OF CVSA

Formation of CVSA

The Alliance began in 1980 as an informal gathering of western state agencies and Canadian provinces responsible for conducting commercial motor vehicle enforcement functions.

Collaborative Partnership

Early on, there was recognition that various states and provinces were, in large part, using common criteria for regulation and commercial motor vehicle inspection functions but there was also a redundancy of work effort.

Uniform Inspection Standards

A memorandum of understanding (MOU) was developed to establish uniformity and reciprocity of highway enforcement and improve the safe operation of commercial motor vehicles. The MOU outlined minimum inspections and out-of-service criteria the parties to the agreement would follow. Most importantly, the MOU established that various state and provincial agencies would not only be uniform, but would recognize each other's inspections of commercial motor vehicles, their drivers and cargo.



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ORIGINS OF CVSA

By 1982, interest in the Alliance was high in Canada and the United States, and many non-governmental persons, associations and companies wanted to play an active supportive role. To accommodate this expanding interest, in October 1982, bylaws were ratified to create CVSA's international scope and added provisions for associate membership. The new organizational structure set the framework for commercial vehicle uniformity and reciprocity in enforcement practices throughout North America today.

The U.S. Surface Transportation Assistance Act of 1982 established funding for state motor carrier enforcement programs. The Act provided important funding for state programs but there was a need to unify the inspection and out-of-service criteria of CVSA with that of the Motor Carrier Safety Assistance Program (MCSAP). In August 1984, the criteria of both procedures were melded into one North American standard, which has been adopted by both MCSAP and CVSA.



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ORIGINS OF CVSA

In 1985, CVSA's membership and activities grew to the point that it became necessary to create an executive director position and establish a centralized office.

In 1988, the alliance started its Operation Road check 72-hour roadside inspection. This event has been held annually since 1991.

In 1991, the Alliance, which had been made up of Canada and the United States, expanded to include Mexico, making CVSA the North American alliance that it is today.

In 2024, CVSA members conducted over 4 Million CMV Inspections.
